FOCUS: Burnout vs. Compassion Fatigue

People who work in the mental health field are often very passionate and dedicated to helping others that they tend to forget to take care of themselves and/or feel guilty about taking some time for themselves. The focus of this month's newsletter is to help spread the understanding between compassion fatigue and burnout. These are common concepts that anyone in a care-giving role should be aware about especially when working with clients with complex trauma.

Compassion Fatigue vs Burnout

Compassion Fatigue is NOT "burnout".

 Burnout is associated with stress and hassles involved in your work; it is very cumulative, is relatively predictable and frequently a vacation or change of job helps a great deal.

Compassion Fatigue is very different.

Compassion Fatigue is a state of tension and preoccupation with the individual or cumulative trauma of clients as manifested in one or more ways including re-experiencing the traumatic event, avoidance/numbing of reminders of the event, and persistent arousal. Although similar to critical incident stress (being traumatized by something you actually experience or see), with CF you are absorbing the trauma through the eyes and ears of your clients. It can be thought of as secondary post-traumatic stress. (Ace Network www.ace-network.com)

This presentation, stemming from ACRC's 12 position paper, builds on the previous papers in the Redefining Residential Series to address psychotropic medication use in children and youth. This presentation will discuss the importance of establishing efficient methods of measuring response and communication within a multidisciplinary treatment setting. In addition, a critical analysis of the evidence for use of psychotropic medication with children and youth will be explored, examining the complications of

multiple medication use and the ever-increasing complexity of youth entering care or at risk of entering care. Finally, discussion will include the influence of combined treatments and issues in monitoring outcomes across these dynamic treatment settings.
